President's Message

Celebrating Region 5

What an incredible year we have experienced in Region 5, the excitement and energy that has been felt at the rides has been captivating. A **HUGE** congratulations to all the riders that placed Nationally and Regionally. It takes a tremendous amount of work and dedication to perform at this level for you and your equine. Come and celebrate your success at the Mini Convention, March 18, 2023, in Murfreesboro, TN. Invite your friends and family to celebrate with us, it's a fun time for all. The National Convention will be February 17-18, 2023, in Sacramento, California.

There were 12-A/B rides, 9-LeD rides, and 2-Clinics completed in 2022. The 2022 average rider attendance for A/B ride – 28.8, LeD – 23.6, A/B & LeD Combo – 52.4. The schedule for 2022 gave us a good combination of stand-alone LeD rides and combo A/B & LeD rides. Our 2023 schedule will consist of 10- A/B rides, and 9-LeD rides. We have two brand new Ride Managers for 2023, Brandy Eggeman managing Va. Highlands & Mikayla Young managing a brand new ride, The Big Creek Ramble, in Pinnacle, NC. Many thanks to these ladies for stepping up as new Ride Managers. Big thanks to Paula Riley for organizing the ride schedule for the region. There is a clinic scheduled at New Year's Resolution on Friday, January 27, 2023. The clinic will be divided into small groups that rotate through different stations building skills frequently used in common NATRC judging observations.

With the increase in the number of LeD rides and participants, we are needing more LeD judges. The requirements are that you have completed 750 miles in any division, worked as a horsemanship's secretary, complete a written exam, thorough understanding of the LeD Judge's and Management's Manuals and participate in an official training seminar. THE JUNIOR RIDER ASSISTANCE PROGRAM WILL BE CONTINUED FOR THE 2023
RIDE SEASON!

A donor has generously agreed to extend this program to offer up to \$75 Ride Entry Fee Reimbursement for each qualified ride to Junior Riders competing in Region Five during 2023.

To be eligible for the Junior Rider Assistance Program:

- The Junior Rider must be an NATRC competing member of Region 5 NATRC sanctioned ride
- The Junior Rider must time out on the first day of competition of the qualified ride
- The Junior Rider **may not** be riding Distance Only in the qualified ride
- The amount of reimbursement for each qualified ride will be the amount of the Junior Rider entry fee up to \$75
- The Junior Rider must provide, **in writing**, the ride name, ride date, and basic entry fee of each qualified ride to Linda Clayton, along with supporting documentation, such as copies of scorecards, etc. Postmark deadline is December 15, 2023. Will accept scanned, emailed copies (they must be readable).
- A reimbursement check will be presented to each eligible Junior Rider at the Annual Region Five Mini-Convention and Awards Banquet following the ride year conclusion.
- Each recipient is encouraged to be present at the Mini Convention and Awards Banquet in order to receive their reimbursement check.

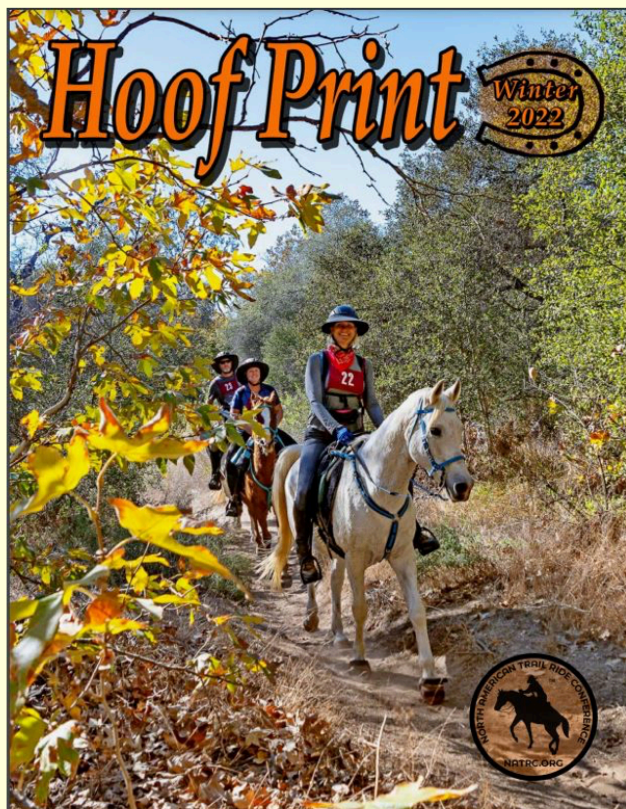

Faith Over Fear

Saturday, I chose faith over fear and boy did we conquer fear! Percy and I rode in an NATRC (The North American Trail Ride Conference) competitive trail ride. NATRC is the premier competitive trail riding (CTR) organization with six regions across North America. I had so wanted to do this ride with Percy but my riding confidence was very low. In the last 2 months, I pulled out of this ride so many times.

Then last Sunday I read a motivational boost from a fellow rider (Garrett Shanks) that said, "You are fairer than the sons of men; Grace is poured upon Your lips; Therefore, God has blessed You forever.

Psalm 45:2

Little self confidence boost! I just wanted to remind everyone to get out of your comfort zone and go do something new! Horses have taught me so much over the years including the importance of getting out and doing new things! We ask our horses to do crazy things all the time as a test of trust and skill set, yet we rarely push ourselves out to the unknown! So why not do a little check and balance with that and test ourselves????

This week I wanna challenge y'all to step out and do something NEW, something SCARY, and something DIFFERENT! And let's see if we pass our own test!? And y'all know what? If we don't pass, failure is perfectly fine, because the only thing to come from failure is a plan for success! Let's Grow together this week!"

This hit me like a ton of bricks when I read it at 4am Sunday morning. I decided right then and there to sign up for the NATRC ride because fear was keeping me from it. And now looking back, I see how things aligned perfectly. Not in my way. See 3 weeks ago, I had the WHOLE house to myself meaning all the kids and Ramon had other activities. So, 3 weeks ago I was to go on a "Poker Run" on Percy. However, after 4 hours of trying to load Percy in the trailer, I had to withdraw my registration because we weren't making it. Percy ALWAYS loads into the trailer. I tried every trick in the book, but he refused. I was DEVASTATED, DISAPPOINTED and mad. When I called Ramon to tell him what happened he could hear the devastation in my voice and he said, "There is a reason why and you will find it."

Fast forward 3 weeks and Saturday morning I had to load Percy up. Even though we worked on it a lot over the last 3 weeks I still had some doubts in myself. At 6:30am Saturday it's still dark, so Percy was resisting going into the trailer. I walked him and I ONTO our patio, opened the door to the house and said, "Isabella come help me load Percy." She rushes out, puts James, boots on and tells me, "Don't worry mom, I know what to do." That came from my 8-year-old!! We go outside and BAM, Percy loads the first time! I drop Isabella off at her Godparents (Thank God for them!) and head out to Pyne Road Park, LaGrange, GA.

Once again, so many emotions. I didn't have my security blanket, which is Ramon. I met him at Pyne Road Park on a trail ride over 10 years ago, and ever since then we have always ridden together. But since he was out hunting, I wanted to do something for myself. I wanted to accomplish something for myself, so I kept driving.

Upon arrival, a good friend and one of the ride's coordinators, Lisa Henson linked me up with a mentor. In NATRC rides, they have a mentor/mentee program and it is worth its weight gold! Lisa did know I was totally out of my comfort zone and there was a good chance I would back out, so she put me with the most amazing lady, Jennifer Mulligan and another teammate Chrissie. These two ladies were phenomenal and had the utmost patience with me. Jennifer has so many accolades to her riding career, but most of all she was my teacher and became my friend. Percy still has that track thoroughbred instinct; when he is with a bunch of horses he wants to WIN. Even though this is a timed event, it's a paced timed event. So going fast is good but too fast is not good.

Jennifer saw where Percy, when asked to cross a stream or ditch, would jump it. After our first jump, she said Percy had perfect form and I stayed on. LOL! She knew one of our weaknesses. Jennifer trusted my riding skills and my partnership with Percy so much that she would go into the ditch and wait, causing Percy to have to walk down into it and then cross.

Jennifer just taught me soooooo much yesterday. My big boy jiggled and wiggled the entire 9.4 miles. At the beginning Chrissie told me that typically after 2 miles, her horse calms down, so at 9.2 miles I joked back
"I'm waiting on that 2-mile calmness. "

But let me tell you what Percy did, and in my book did well! There were a handful of judged obstacles. The first one, Percy jumped a ditch and we bombed. However, for the others, Percy was calm and mindful and we completed them! He stepped over a large log and stood still with the log between his legs. We backed up between two trees, we dismounted and mounted like a pro.



this ride there is a "Vet Check." The rider dismounts, loosens the saddle, takes the reins off and stands for 10 minutes to cool down their horse. After 10 minutes the horse is checked for its respiration and pulse. If a horse isn't between the target numbers you have to wait. Percy stood like a gentleman the entire 10 minutes, I fanned him off with my new little NATRC fan while also fanning myself and when it came time for the vet check, Percy was an 11 and 4, which means he is in GREAT shape. (Good thing they only check the horses! HAHA!)

Earlier this week, I had reached out to a very good friend who is also one of the most amazing natural horsemanship trainers I know. I was brutally honest on where things were with Percy and me because my confidence with Percy was at an all-time low. Chris gave me a few things to work on which we did, but then he said, "Have fun and remember to breath." Coincidentally, Jennifer, my ride mentor, kept reminding me to breathe throughout the ride. It was like Chris gave her the memo!

Percy wanted to race, but I held him back, stayed on and we FINISHED!!!!!! Talk about a wave of emotions at the finish line! I am still very emotional when thinking about what an amazing day it was, because I rode through my fear, and will be forever grateful to my village of people!

Thank you to the Gonzalez family for watching Isabella ALL day! And a big thank you to [Lisa Wright Henson](#) who was one of the main coordinators and kept on asking me if I was going to ride! I wouldn't have done it without you all! Thank you! *(And Ramon was right, this was the reason why we didn't load that early morning 3 weeks ago)*

Christmas in the Pines

2023 Season Kick Off

A beautiful weekend awaited us in Milton, Florida. No rain in the forecast. This was the first ride of the 2023 season and both my granddaughters were competing. On Saturday, Kinsley & Alora rode together. At the second P&R, Alora's horse, Tally was having trouble pulsing down and Alora did the responsible thing and opted to pull. Kinsley finished Saturday by herself.

After talking it over with Kinsley, and my riding partner Bobby Fields, we decided to have Kinsley ride with us.

Sunday morning was another glorious day! Linda Galbraith, the vet judge, asked the riders to do a big U for the Sunday morning soundness trot. I finished the trot and turned to watch Kinsley. About the middle of her trot, I saw Percy, her horse, do some fancy dance steps, then completed the trot-by. As Kinsley came up to me, she said her bridle broke. Boy, did it! A stud holding the noseband to the hackamore had broken, and the entire hack was just hanging by one strap. We didn't have much time before time-out, so I hurried back to the trailer where I had a spare hackamore. This one didn't have the oomph the broken one did, but it would serve for one day. We had the hackamores changed out in less than five minutes! Then off to the timer we went.

This would be the first ride that both Dana (my horse) and Percy (my granddaughter Kinsley's horse) would be in the same class at the same ride. In the past, I had ridden Open and Kinsley, CP, so our horses had been separated. They got used to this idea and it didn't cause much of a problem. Due to work and school, Kinsley had not been competing for most of 2022, and I had started riding CP. We have often ridden together on trail rides, but never at a competition. Poor Kinsley found out the Grandma she had at home was NOT the same Grandma at a competition!!

Having ridden open for many years, I tend to focus quite a bit on ride time. I like to ride minimum time, then walk the last two miles into camp. This means a lot of trotting during the day, with some walking and stopping to let the horses munch on whatever they can find. At Christmas in the Pines, this means yummy bamboo.

After timing out, off we went, Kinsley, Bobby and me. Trotting A LOT. We arrived at the first P&R, and I asked Kinsley if she would rather ride with the group that was behind us. She asked if I was going to ride the whole ride like we had started out. When I told her I was, she opted to hang back and ride with the competitors behind us. What a mistake!!

Bobby and I left the P&R. For the next few miles, as we trotted through the pine forest on a sandy trail, we could hear Percy screaming. We came to a soundness trot, and as we finished, we knew Kinsley was right behind us as Percy was much louder. I opted to stop and wait for Kinsley as I knew she was having a hard time. She was grateful to ride with us again as Percy now became a very happy horse. It was at this point, Bobby discovered he had lost his cell phone, so went to find it while Kinsley and I proceeded down the trail. He was able to catch up with us a short time later and we merrily continued our ride. We had a fabulous time riding through the pine forest on a near-perfect day.

If you have never ridden this ride, it would be well worth your time. Barefoot friendly, we ride through a pine forest on sandy trails. There were several water crossings, so plenty of on-trail water for the horses. There are several places that are perfect for a nice canter, and some winding, one-track trails. The campground is super nice with water/electric hookups, fire rings and plenty of room for big rigs. This is a great ride to start the new season!



National News

On November 12, 2022, the NBOD met via Zoom

From the Executive Director, Ruth Meisemer needs to know the name(s) of the persons who will receive the year-end reports. Kris emailed that Sherry Garnes and Tanya Kingsley would receive our reports.

The Treasurer's & Budget Report will be covered by Kris Gray.

John Zeliff introduced a guest speaker, Dr. Tamara Gull, to talk about ulcer medication, and the difference between a maintenance dose and a preventative dose. The NBOD discussed allowing this medication during competition.

Virtual Challenge committee: It was decided not to offer the virtual obstacle challenge in 2023. The mileage challenge will continue.

Media Advisory: Discussion on changing Hoofprints to 3 issues a year instead of 4. Jamie has stepped down from editor of Hoofprints and announced that two volunteers have stepped forward to fill her shoes.

A motion was made, seconded and passed to put Phenibut on the prohibited drug list.

The National Convention will be held in Sacramento, CA at the Wyndham. Must call to make reservations as there is no online registration procedure.

For 2023, even though the weight classes are combined, sweepstakes will still be awarded.

Rule change proposals:

- Continue the combined weight classes for 2024 – it was determined that we are in a “wait and see” pattern for the time being. We need to know how this works for 2023 before making the decision.
- Change membership year to match ride year – motion failed to carry forward
- Remove splint boot, bell boot and wrap restrictions – motion failed
- Appendix B. Categories of prohibited substances:
 - Allow basic injury care during ride – This would allow topical agents, including ophthalmic, optic, dermal and wound ointments and liniments if they do not contain any prohibited substance. Carried forward.
 - Omeprazole administered at a preventative dose no higher than 1 mg/kg/day
 - Acid neutralizers (e.g. Maalox, Neighlox)
- Clarify rule book appendice changes may be made administratively: Changes to Rule Book Appendices may be made administratively but 1) must be approved by the NBOD and 2) changes must be posted in the Hoof Print and/or the national website 45 days prior to implementation or as soon as is practical. Motion carried.
- Standardize scoring approach of LeD with O/N/CP – point deductions for 100%. Motion failed.
- National LeD awards: National recognition for LeD high point team. Motion carried.
- Electric fencing allowed at rides: motion failed

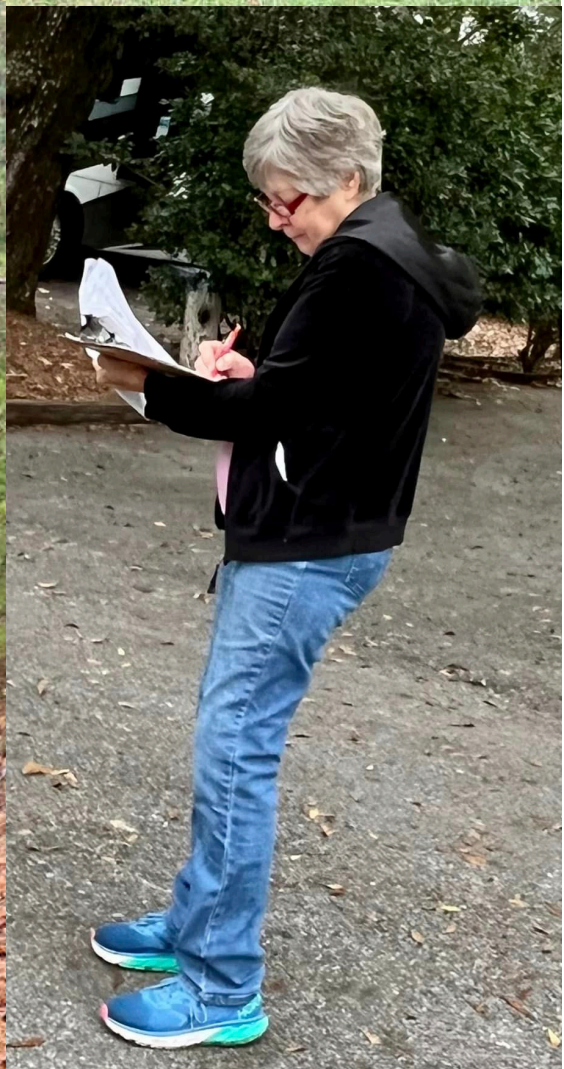


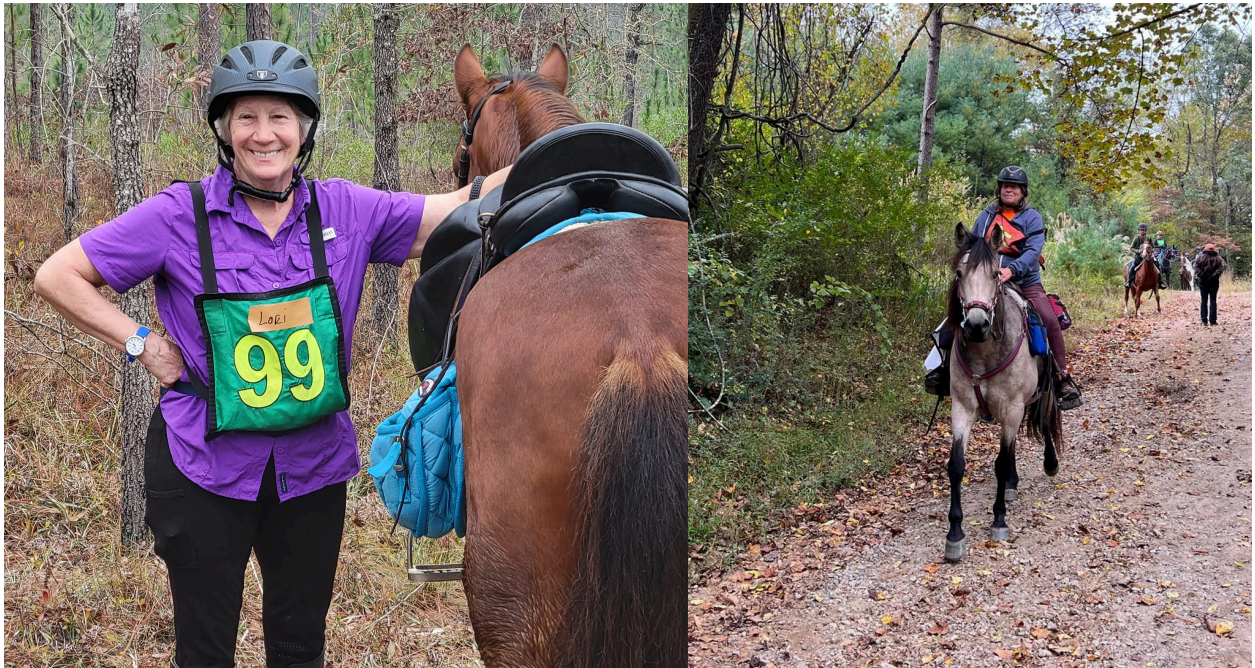
